### 1. Meeting Opening

### 4. Matters for Discussion

### 4.1. EVSE on AC Dandy Load Miser

The submission from the proponent was viewed on screen and it was noted that the Administrator is looking for input on whether a STANDATA should be issued for this topic. It was noted that this code rule is simply providing options for compliance: 8-106 (2) or 8-106 (11) can be used. If confusion on this topic is widespread across the province, a STANDATA could be issued to clarify.

It was suggested issues may arise if AHJs aren't aware that both options are valid. The proponent's question about which rule should be applied was answered through correspondence with various industry members, including members of the pertinent CSA committee. It was agreed that the code rules are clear and there's no need for a STANDATA. This topic is considered closed. The Administrator will reply to the proponent. [Cormier]

#### 4.2. Working Group Reports

#### 4.2.1. Colour Coding

This item was deferred to next meeting as the working group chair is not present.

#### 4.2.2. Non-Metallic Outer Jacket Cables

It was reported that this group has not yet met and will do so prior to the next ESC meeting.

#### 4.2.3. 2021 CE Code Review

It was reported that the group's work is complete and recommendations were previously presented to the ESC.

#### 4.3. BSC Liaison

It was reported that no items related to the electrical discipline were discussed at the last BSC meeting.

#### 4.4. Administrator/AMA Report

The Administrator provided a written report prior to the meeting and the following was highlighted:

- Safety tips are being reviewed by AMA for publication on Council website.
- On overview of upcoming industry meetings was given.
- Utility Memorandums Meeting
  - A municipal utility has asked homeowners for items that are above and beyond the code (ex. a larger conductor size), and this was brought to the attention of the Provincial Electrical Administrator.
  - The technical details of the requests are sound, but there are questions about whether the process is appropriate.

- The items are on the consumer side of the demarcation point.
- This will be added as a discussion item to a future ESC meeting, specifically to gather input on the following questions:
  - Do other municipalities have these same issues?
  - If it is provincial issue and a STANDATA for consistency would be helpful, what code rules would be referenced in the STANDATA?
  - What mechanism or policy tool is the municipal utility using to ask for something beyond what the code stipulates? How would it be enforced if the homeowner doesn't comply?
  - If the item is not related to the code or Safety Codes Act, should SCOs enforce them?

On the topic of aluminium wiring in residences, a member reported that there is an effort from some insurance companies to not insure homes (often rental units) that contain aluminium wiring. The insurance companies are telling owners to re-wire the home with copper. This has not previously been reported as an issue to the Provincial Electrical Administrator, and there is an existing notice on aluminium wiring in houses. Another member reported having documentation regarding an issue with aluminium conductors within range receptacles breaking, despite the receptacles being approved for aluminium wiring. This topic will be added to a future agenda for further discussion. [Council Administration]

Members were asked to research this topic within their industry segments and submit input prior to the next meeting. [AII]

### 5.1. Round Table

- Questions have been posed to Municipal Affairs about solar photovoltaics: If a home has 60 amps of supply authority and 40 amps of solar, would they have a 100 amp service that satisfies Section 8 of the CE Code? The member representing the Solar industry suggested this would not be the case as per Rule 64-112. The electricity generated by solar photovoltaics doesn't count towards the service but does count for loading on the buss bar. It was noted that battery systems that can inject current are expected in the future and will make calculations more complicated. This may be brought forward as a discussion topic if/when it becomes an issue in industry.
- CSA is forming new technical committee on photovoltaics and will be looking for members. The focus for this committee is on specialization rather than general equipment safety. Ed Knaggs will bring more info as it becomes available.

- IEEE IAS ESTMP Workshop is being held March 20-23, 2022, at the River Cree Resort in Edmonton. ESC member Scott Basinger will be participating in panel discussion about life extension of electrical equipment and co-presenting a tutorial on overcurrent protection.
- The Chair wishes all a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.
